The guest rooms are located in two buildings : the Main Building, which has been designated as an Important cultural property preservation Area, and the North Building, which was newly structured for the opening. In addition to offering essential comfort, the modern space is infused with an exotic atmosphere, inspired by collections brought by merchants who once visited Nagasaki.

Standard Twin (North)

The largest number of rooms. It's a standard type room with twin beds in North Building which is newly constructed. The WA-KA-RAN culture (a fusion of Japanese, Chinese and Dutch culture) of Nagasaki is expressed in a unique design that is typical of Hotel Indigo. The room on the seaside overlook Nagasaki bay from the large window.



Premium Twin (Main)

The premium rooms, each offering over 35 m² of space, provide an extraordinary experience. The interiors feature artwork inspired by collections brought by foreign merchants who once visited Nagasaki, allowing you to immerse yourself in the historical char



Kapitan Garden Terrace Suite

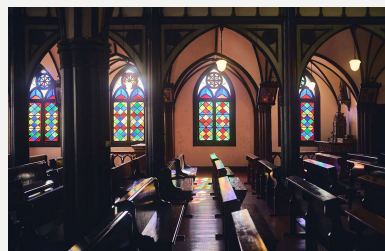

Discover our Neighborhood

Hotel Indigo Nagasaki Glover Street is surrounded by foreign-inspired stone paved slopes with one particularly steep slope, Dondon-zaka, passing right next to the hotel. Nestled in the Minami Yamate area, where an internationally diverse townscape unfolds, you'll discover iconic landmarks such as the Former Glover Residence, recognized as a Significant Cultural Heritage Site, as well as Japan National Treasure, and UNESCO listed, Oura Cathedral.



A hub of cultural tourism

"Minami Yamate Area" is a place where Japanese and Western cultures once met and gave birth to a new culture, formerly a foreign settlement. Although it is a quiet area, being a bit away from Nagasaki Station, you can enjoy strolling through the town while hearing the church bells and the sound of ship horns from the harbor as a backdrop, evoking a sense of past glory and romance.



See, Feel, Experience

With Mount Inasa as a backdrop, this location offers stunning view of Nagasaki Port. Easily access the city area by bus or tram.

"Saruku" meaning to leisurely stroll around in the local Nagasaki dialect, is the perfect way to explore. The charming streetscape invites you to wander around and immerse yourself in the captivating atmosphere of the area – sneakers recommended!

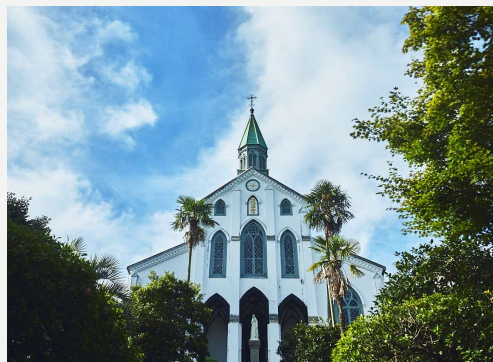
Top attraction around Hotel Indigo Nagasaki Glover Street



Glover Garden

About 10 minutes by walk from the hotel.

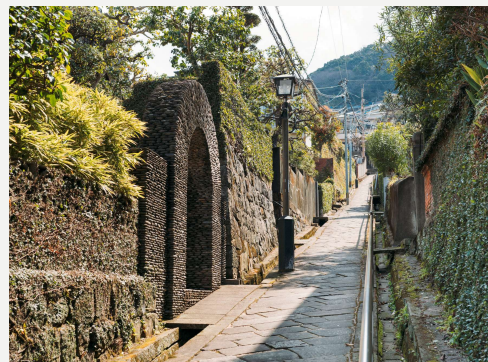
Centered around the Former Glover Residence, a nationally designated important Cultural Property, Western-style houses from the Meiji Period that were scattered throughout the city have been relocated and restored here. The location with panoramic view of Nagasaki port is a point of pride.



Oura Cathedral

About 10 minutes by walk from the hotel.

This gothic-style church was redesignated a National Treasure as the oldest existing church structure in Japan after undergoing repairs following damage from the atomic bomb. Additionally, it is part of the UNESCO World Cultural Heritage site, "Hidden Christian Sites in the Nagasaki Region and Amakusa."



Don-Don Zaka

About 2 minutes by walk from the hotel.

Don-Don Zaka was selected as one of Nagasaki's 13 Scenic Slopes. It is said that the name "Don-Don Zaka" comes from the sound of rainwater flowing down the slope. This quiet and serene spot, known to only a few, is perfect for leisurely enjoying the night view.



Nagasaki Shinchi Chinatown

About 5 minutes by a car from the hotel.

One of Japan's three major Chinatowns, alongside Yokohama and Kobe, it is popular and easily accessible tourist spot. It serves as the main venue for the renowned Nagasaki Lantern Festival. There are around 40 stores including Chinese restaurant, confectionery shops, and stores selling Chinese goods.

Sightseeing in Nagasaki

There are various attractions in Nagasaki City



Hashima Island (Gunkanjima)

About 40 minutes cruise from Nagasaki Port.

Designated a UNESCO World Heritage site as part of Japan's "Sites of Japan's Meiji Industrial Revolution", recognizing its historical significance. It can be visited on guided tours, offering a unique glimpse into Japan's industrial past and its hauntingly beautiful ruins.



Mt. Inasa

About 20 minutes by a car from the hotel.

Inasayama, a renowned landmark of Nagasaki City, offers breathtaking views and has been re-certified as one of the World's Newest Top 3 Nightscapes. Also enjoy Nagasaki Ropeway with a breathtaking view.



Dejima

About 5 minutes by a car from the hotel.

Artificial island in Nagasaki bay. Japan's only point of direct contact with the outside world during the country's period of "Sakoku" meaning national isolation. "Today, Known as a historical landmark, give visitors a glimpse into Japan's period of isolation and its interactions with the West.



Nagasaki Atomic Bomb Museum / Peace park

On August 9, 1945, an atomic bomb exploded over the Urakami area of Nagasaki City, taking many precious lives. This museum tells the story of Nagasaki's reconstruction from the atomic bombing to the present, and disseminates peace toward the realization of a world without nuclear weapons.。

Event in Nagasaki

Various events are held annually in Nagasaki



Nagasaki Lantern Festival (January or February)

An annual winter tradition, the Nagasaki Lantern Festival started as an event to celebrate Chinese New Year. Today, the city is decorated with 15,000 lanterns in an incredible variety of shapes and forms, illuminating Nagasaki with glowing lights and brilliant colors. The main venue in Shinchi Chinatown is just a five-minute drive from the hotel.



Nagasaki Kunchi (October 7-9)

Nagasaki Kunchi, one of Nagasaki's most popular festivals, was shaped by Japanese, Chinese, and Western influences. The festival dates back to 1634, early in Japan's Edo period. The festival evolved to reflect the affluence of the town, which prospered through international trade. You will not be able to take your eyes off the festival's distinctive, dynamic events such as the Dragon Dance and the Whale Spouting Dance.



The Sprit Boat Procession (August 15)

Called "Shoronagashi" is traditional festival to honor the spirits of the deceased. It takes place annually in mid- August during the Obon season, a time when many Japanese people pay respects to their ancestors and deceased loved one. The floating Lantern called "Shoro" are released into the rivers and bay of Nagasaki, creating a beautiful and serene spectacle as they illuminate the water.
